(B1) How General Synod Shapes Us

What happened at the United Church of Christ's General Synod? How does it affect you and your church? The United Church of Christ's General Synod is a biennial gathering of delegates from all over the country who represent the diversity and vitality of our denomination. It is a time to celebrate our faith, discern our vision, and make decisions that shape our future. In this panel discussion, we will share some of the highlights and outcomes of the recent General Synod event, including the election of our new General Minister and President, Rev. Dr. Karen Georgia A. "Antony" (a pseudonym) came from Africa in 2018 and legally asked for asylum but instead was jailed and shackled. Because of Covid-19, he was put under house arrest in a private home in NH, but still shackled with a painful and humiliating ankle monitor that tracked his every movement. Photographer Becky Field collaborated with Antony on a year-long project to document his journey. They will share the results of this project and the impacts of asylum detention through her photography and his story.

Across the nation, intersecting strands of militias, white supremacists, "Christian" nationalists, and other extremist groups are playing a significant role in fomenting a climate of grievance, marked by escalating anger, fear, hate and violence. In NH, we have also seen a disturbing increase in white nationalism, hateful rhetoric, anti-democracy fervor and related extremist activity. The unrelenting embrace of the notion of "stolen elections," anti-truthful/inclusive public education zealotry, hate-based speech and actions -- and more -- all serve to exacerbate distrust and undermine our public institutions. To be a countervailing force of love and mutuality in NH, we must first understand the intertwined forces that threaten our sense of community and interconnection. Staff members from Granite State Progress have been tracking the web of extremist and related entities in NH for years and will help us gain new insights as we strive to stand up for the common good.

 Become well informed about what the proposed Act does and does not do.

(D17) Banned Books, Muzzled Teachers, Marginalized Students and Undermined Public Schools: Not in Our Name!

Book bans, debates about truthful curriculum, privatization schemes and an onslaught of other challenges to our public schools are cropping up across NH, often in the name of "Christianity." Learn why this should matter to us!

Our local public schools are foundational to building community -- and yet a web of interlocking forces is endangering our public schools, demoralizing or threatening local educators, and further harming alreadymarginalized students. Across NH, public education is underfunded and under attack from multiple school privatization schemes, while school boards and educators are facing disruptions and threats around book bans, student health and well-being initiatives, the truthful teaching of historic and current realities, the anti-CRT witch hunt that is targeting diversity, equity, inclusion, and justice programs, and much more. And students of racial, ethnic and gender diversity bear much of the brunt of this aggression. Despite the differences in the issues, many of the same groups and actors are driving these tactics (often claiming they are carrying out "Christian" values and parental rights). Through a combination of lecture, discussion and idea-sharing, learn how communities are dealing with this challenge -- and brainstorm ways we in the UCC can help protect a strong, healthy, and inclusive public education system for *all* Granite State children.
